

## **Alternative Perspectives: Elements of a Successful AP Submission**

### **Introduction**

The author introduces the basis for the alternative view. Usually, this means an alternative to a specific theory, methodology, or a view of language or teaching. The issue is clear from the onset.

### **Body**

This issue, or the need for the alternative view that was identified in the introduction, gets to be developed in the rest of the manuscript. The development may include some literature review, and also a strong discussion as to what the shortcomings of the opposite view are and why this new alternative view is needed. Benefits and strengths of the new view are also explained and justified. Relevant literature is used to support the claims. Examples are given when needed to support or illustrate a claim or a position.

### **Conclusion**

The conclusion may include a personal note or a general note that is addressed either to the field or to a specific practice.

### **Requirements**

- This paper should be 1,000 words long
- The references should not be longer than 1/3 of a page (maximum).
- Submission needs to reflect the genre elements identified above.
- If the paper does not contain the outline above, it will be returned either for a revision, or for a resubmission.
